

WHY SHOULD WE HAVE AN ACTION PLAN?

Because having one helps you plan out step by step, how your club will get to where it wants to be.

Alice and her conversation with the Cheshire Cat in Lewis Carrol's Alice in Wonderland.

The Visioning Process will help your Club decide which way you want to go.

Process & Outcomes

- 1. Who are we?
- 2. Where are we?
- 3. Where do we want to be?
- 4. How will we get there?
- 5. How will we know when we have arrived?

The focus is on where you want your club to be in three years.



Examples of Specific, Achievable Goals

Send two students to RYLA in 2025
 Increase our membership to 45 people by 2027
 Raise \$15,000 for Harvest Against Hunger in 2024-2025
 Write a Global Grant & have it approved by July 2025



The Master Plan

Master Plan – (Where do we want to be?)

Design multi-year coordinated plans for continuity, consistency and consensus

Place the Visioning ideas on the plan to show the results to the club. Once the club has approved the Master Plan, each idea will need an Action Plan.

Develop a Master Plan from the Vision Template:

Some goals may be listed in all 3 years (either ongoing or Phase 1, Phase 2, etc.) Each Goal will have an Action Plan (Who will do what by when?)

- Use a separate Action Plan sheet for each of the goals
- Goals may need to be adjusted as the plan unfolds

Execution: Who will do what by when?

Develop an Action Plan from each goal on the Master Plan:

Actions/tasks – try to list in order, knowing that some new steps may become apparent Actions/Tasks – consider using an action verb (suggests movement) Actions/Tasks – break down bigger tasks into a list of smaller tasks if needed

Actions/Tasks – be mindful of potential obstacles. List alternative ideas in comments Actions/Tasks – develop timelines

Actions/Tasks – define resources: funds needed, partners to involve, connections to make

Actions/Tasks – describe the outcome

VISION

Actions/Tasks – monitor progress (see Vison to Success Guide)

Vision to Success: Next Steps

- 1. Gather ideas with which to move forward
- 2. Create a Club Statement of Purpose
- 3. Create the Master Plan
- 4. Share Club Visioning results with the club
- 5. Choose a Club Impact Leader or Club Impact Team
- 6. Create an Action Plan for each goal in the Master Plan



Visioning Outcomes

- What the club stands for in its community
- The club's target membership size in 3 years
- Ideas that become goals based on 2-step voting process
- A process to prioritize and manage set goals through a Master Plan and Action Plans
- Excitement throughout the club for what it is becoming
